The Miramichi Folksong Festival

The following images were taken at the Miramichi Folksong Festival. The original photos are preserved at the New Brunswick Museum in Saint John, NB and now have been put on display as a part of a digital collection. Thanks to Louise Manny, they will be forever available to all; a piece of living history.

Traditionally, people would tell the story of their everyday lives through songs. These people were fisherman, involved in logging, etc. These jobs are part of the regional identity of people living in the Maritimes. Recordings of these songs were made by Louise Manny beginning in the 1950s (by request of Lord Beaverbrook). Manny created the Folksong Festival to showcase the talented singers she recorded.

Originally, the 3-day event saw people singing their songs acappella. Over time, people were allowed to bring instruments (guitars, banjos, harmonicas and, of course, fiddles). The stories in the songs, the instruments used, and the tradition of gathering to listen to 'the show' are all a part of the identity of people in the Maritimes. Now a 6-day event, this festival shows that regional pride is alive and well.

Allen Kelly, a performer at every Festival since it began, passed away in October of 2008. He made his final appearance at the Festival in August of 2008.
